
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The ERM "steps" are shown graphically below:

".....Before beginning the process of managing risk at the ministry level, an understanding of the various interconnected contextual elements that affect the ministry must be developed. The management of risk at the ministry level is not a linear process but a balancing of a number of interconnected elements that interact with each other. These elements must be in balance with each other if risk management is to be effective. Specific risks cannot be addressed in isolation from each other. The management of one risk may have an impact on another. Management actions that are effective in controlling more than one risk simultaneously may be achievable....."

Of all organizations that <u>should employ</u> Enterprise Risk

Management techniques for dealing with risk, government
institutions/entities should be in the forefront because of many
duplications of services and similarity in the risks encountered. In
other words, operations in these organizations tend to be of the
"silo" variety that should be discouraged because of duplications of
